



## FR. MAC'S 10<sup>th</sup> ANNIVERSARY


Fr. Mac first came to our parish on October 16, 2006.

### **A WORD TO THE CHURCH FOR THE WORLD – FROM THE HOUSE OF BISHOPS**

Greetings from Detroit, a city determined to be revived. Greetings also from the city of Flint, where we are reminded that the gift of water has for many of our brothers and sisters become contaminated.

Here we have been exhorted to set our sights beyond ourselves and to minister to the several nations where we serve and the wider world.

We lament the stark joylessness that marks our present time. We decry angry political rhetoric which rages while fissures widen within society along racial, economic, educational, religious, cultural and generational lines. We refuse to look away as poverty, cruelty and war force families to become migrants enduring statelessness and demonization. We renounce the gun violence and drug addiction that steal lives and crush souls while others succumb to fear and cynicism, abandoning any sense of neighborliness.

Yet, in all this, “we do not despair” (2 Cor. 4:8.). We remember that God in Christ entered our earthly neighborhood during a time of political volatility and economic inequality. To this current crisis we bring our faith in Jesus. By God's grace, we choose to see in this moment an urgent opportunity to follow Jesus into our fractured neighborhoods, the nation and the world.

Every member of the church has been “called for a time such as this.” (Esther 4:14). Let prophets tell the truth in love. Let reconcilers move boldly into places of division and disagreement. Let evangelists inspire us to tell the story of Jesus in new and compelling ways. Let leaders lead with courage and joy.

In the hope of the Resurrection let us all pray for God to work through our struggle and confusion to accomplish God's purposes on earth.


The Episcopal Church House of Bishops met September 15<sup>th</sup> to September 20<sup>th</sup> in Detroit MI (Diocese of Michigan).

### STEWARDSHIP – WATER CONSERVATION TIPS

Our September Prayers of the People include the following prayer: *“Give us all a reverence for the earth as your own creation, that we may use its resources rightly in the service of others and to your honor and glory.”*

When I heard this prayer, I couldn't help but think of our current water crisis. As you are well aware, we are in the midst of a dangerous drought, where 'extreme drought' conditions now cover 52 percent of our state. The Milford Water Company has implemented a Stage IV water restriction, which means 'ALL outside water usage is strictly forbidden'. A second offense could result in having your water turned off.

In stewardship to our environment, I wondered what additional small steps we could all do to help conserve water. I checked numerous websites for conservation ideas and have listed a variety of suggestions below. Please feel free to offer ways your family and you have implemented to reduce your need for this valuable and critical natural resource.

#### Save water around the house:

- Always turn water faucets off tightly so they do not drip. Repair any leaks in and around your taps.
- When hand-washing dishes, never run water continuously. Wash dishes in a partially filled sink and then rinse.
- Have a full load before washing clothes or running your dishwasher. If this is not possible for washing your clothes, readjust the load-size control. Washing and dishwasher appliances, which are 10 years old or older, may not be as water efficient as newer machines.
- Think about washing your dishes in lukewarm water.

#### Save water while bathing:

- When brushing your teeth, turn the water off while you are actually brushing. Use short bursts of water for cleaning your brush. This saves about 80% of the water normally used.
- Use a glass of water for mouth rinsing.
- When washing or shaving, partially fill the sink and use that water rather than running the tap continuously. This saves about 60% of the water normally used.
- Use either low-flow shower heads or adjustable flow-reducer devices on your shower heads. They reduce flow by at least 25%.
- Aim for a shorter shower. Do you really need to wash your hair daily?

#### Save water while eating:

- Don't accept glasses of water at restaurants unless you intend to drink it.
- For a cold glass of water, instead of running the water to get it cold, use ice cubes or fill reusable water bottles or keep a water pitcher in the refrigerator.

### SEPTEMBER VESTRY MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

Sarajane Duncan-Richter facilitated our September meeting. The minutes of all our vestry meetings are posted on the Trinity website. The September highlights include:

**Plan for Windows** – The property committee has done a lot of work on researching new windows. We have some estimates which range from around 42K to 44K. A motion was made and seconded from the floor to approve funding the installation of new windows in the parish hall and downstairs not to exceed \$50K.

The insurance settlement of approximately 52K will cover the walls downstairs and some of the flooring.

We are planning a Capital Campaign in the spring to fund multiple projects.

**Education and Spiritual Development:** Ginny Starkis & Elaina Chambers – The youth group will be starting next Sunday. The new Curriculum arrived. Fr. Mac sent letters to the parents of the confirmation age kids this week.

**Mission and Outreach:** Lucille Clinkman and Cheryl Martin – Laundry Love is going along very well. A new washer and drier was purchased for the homeless shelter here in Milford. Lucille would like to lead the Change the Babies Campaign. She'll be making an announcement this week at church to collect pocket change for two or three weeks.

**Parish Life:** Steve Ketcham and Ralph Stafford – The BBQ yesterday was very well attended.

**Christmas Fair Preparation** – Gayle is starting to touch base with people. We're going to print the tickets for the bazaar ourselves rather than using a printing company.

**Management of Parish Resources:** John Ellis and Jim Phillips – we'll be ramping up the energy audit to really assess what else is needed for the church building. And the organ committee is in full swing.

**10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration** – October 16<sup>th</sup> is Fr. Mac's 10 year anniversary. We'll do a brunch on that day.

**Stewardship Planning** – The pledge campaign will run from October 2 through October 30. John Ellis, Diane Belamarich and Annie Toffey are leading up the campaign.

**Rector's Report (Fr. Mac)** The summer was full. Fr. Mac thanks the supervisors Ginny Starkis, Beth Washburn and Mary Johnson who ran the lunch program at Trinity this summer.


### UTO INGATHERING

FROM THE EDITOR: GOD'S BOOK OF MANNERS

In the 1997 film, *Titanic*, Jack is sitting at his first elegantly set table with gold embossed plates, saucers, cups, glassware and utensils. He looks down at the elaborate table with a quizzical look as he views the many spoons, forks and knives - what do I do now? Just then, Molly Brown speaks up and says, "Start at the outside and work in." In seven words Molly had taught Jack table etiquette and manners.

Like eating an elaborate dinner that God has prepared, there is etiquette and manners to be followed when we read His eloquent word:

**1. Accept your seating:**

God has placed you where you are for a reason - accept it and enjoy the ride. When God wants you to move higher up, He will show you how and when.

**2. Read the menu:**

Spend time reading what God has prepared. Read your Bible and meditate on His word. It will give you strength and illumination according to God's plan for your life. It will keep you on course, and remind you of your responsibilities in order to fulfill the plan God has for your life.

**3. How to chew:**

Too many Christians expect God to spoon feed them a blessing. He is supposed to place it in our mouths, work our jaws to chew it up, and help us swallow it. We want God to do everything. The fact is that we have the responsibility in God's sovereign world to stay close to Him while being fed when reading His Word.

**4. Pay attention to the fruit:**

The Kingdom of God is all about the fruit. In life, not every tree will bear fruit. That is not our fault. Our job is to plant, water, fertilize and nurture. Each fruit tree receives this care in different ways. Some will make it while others will not. Our job is to make sure they had proper attention.

**5. Finish your meal:**

John 3:16 tells us, "God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son." Some believe that because God has already come and died for the sins of the world they have arrived and don't need to do anything else. However, it is important to finish the phrase regarding man's responsibility: "whosoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have everlasting life." We must daily come to Him in order to receive the forgiveness that He purchased for us.

In *Titanic*, Jack had reached a situation that caused him to hesitate and wonder what was next. It wasn't until Jack learned the rules of the table that he could fully enjoy his meal.

God has prepared an eloquently wonderful meal for us in the Bible and, as we invoke his table manners, we begin to enjoy all he has for us.

### CHANGE THE BABIES

“Change the Babies” is a ministry created by the Rev. Betsy Fisher to support the children living at the Mampong Babies Home in Ghana. The Mampong Babies Home houses 20-30 infants whose mothers have died in childbirth. Many remain there four to five years until the family is able to care for them. Under the direction of Margaret Addai, Superintendent, the Babies Home has become a vital ministry in our companion diocese.

Trinity has made a five-year commitment to this mission. The goal is to raise \$1,500 per year – the cost of caring for one baby from birth to age 5. We will be collecting donations through October 9<sup>th</sup>. Please place your spare change in the jar in the Parish Hall designated for this mission, to help us meet our goal.

When Paul wrote to the church in Rome, he addressed his letter “To all God’s beloved ... who are called to be saints” (Romans 1:7, NRSV). Paul regarded his fellow believers as people who have responded to the good news of Christ by choosing to follow and serve God.

The New Testament emphasizes that Christians are God’s beloved - special people set apart to receive his grace and to be his witnesses. All people whose minds and hearts are devoted to God are “called to be saints.”

About 700 years after the church began, leaders designated November 1<sup>st</sup> as All Saints’ Day to honor people whose lives reflect Christ dwelling within them. Because of what God has done for us, all Christians can wear the label of saint.

We are always seeking volunteers to help with the dinner, including day of preparations, so keep us in mind if you have some time you can give


